

IPNA Archives Update

The archives have left the building! Forty boxes were carefully packed and loaded out of the Trolley Barn the first of October by Emory University's Rose Library staff. There was a terrific send-off for the archives the night before and a collective recognition and celebration of the people that contributed to the revitalization of Inman Park. The transfer of the archives to a climate controlled, secure, and accessible facility will enable others to learn about and be inspired by this important history.

The Rose Library is located on the top floor of Emory's main library, The Woodruff Library. After an inventory of the forty boxes is complete, a finding aid (collection description document) will be drafted and posted online and the physical collection will be open for research. It is cost-free to access the Rose Library and the IPNA Board receives an allowance for reproductions from our material. More details about the Rose Library's policies and planning a visit may be found on their website: rose.library.emory.edu.

Duplicate items, of which there are many, will be returned to IPNA and may resurface at neighborhood meetings. Don't you want to know which houses were on tour in 1983? If so keep an eye out for an archives pop-up at a future IPNA meeting. The history of Inman Park continues to be written and periodic transfers of files will happen between Emory and the IPNA. The Trolley Barn is a supportive partner in this endeavor - a big thank you to them!

In last month's President's Message, Beverly Miller featured the history of Inman Park through longtime resident Eugene Bales experiences and observations growing up on Hale Street. She also noted the work of the Lifelong Inman Park Committee to document and preserve the stories of pioneering residents and the efforts of the new Master Plan Committee. Her call to join in shaping Inman Park's history seems appropriate to reiterate in an article about the archives.



On the Streets Where we Live

Continuing the series on the origins of Inman Park's street names....

KROG STREET

Formerly Wallace Street, after Georgia state lottery trustee Alexander Wallace, was "renamed Krog Street in 1982 after Frederick Krog, who was involved in Atlanta's railroads."

LAKE AVENUE (runs eastward from BeltLine to traffic light intersection at Elizabeth Street)

- "This road was the Turnpike Road, presently known as Lake Avenue and Austin Avenue."
- Formerly named Atlanta to Decatur Turnpike Road, Decatur Turnpike, Forrest Avenue and Forrest Street.
- In 1897 the name of Turnpike Road (or Decatur Pike Road or Pike Road) changed to Lake Avenue.
- A small lake near the intersection of Colquitt Ave & Highland Ave "was
 probably the origin of the name Lake Avenue, which was originally
 applied to Sinclair Avenue." This was part of Hale Investment Company's
 development which was west of Hale Street.

BRICKWORKS CIRCLE

Possibly named after the company that was located on this site.

WEST ASHLAND AVENUE

No information found. There is no indication that this street was originally connected to Ashland Avenue.

MONTAG CIRCLE

From the corporate name connected to Mead Corporation's Blue Horse school supplies. The original circa 1954 Mead building remains as The Blue Horse office condominiums.

AliBaba, a Cultural Aspect of Little Five Points

The feeling of home welcomes anyone who walks through AliBaba's doors whether someone is seeking shelter from rain or picking up food. The restaurant itself is simple: to one side is the kitchen and to the other a doorway which leads to a seating area. However, the homey feeling doesn't come from these factors but from the hospitality shown to customers.

"I don't see you as a customer per say, I see you as a guest," says Fevzi, an owner of Alibaba. "In our culture you don't consider people just a customer. If you come in, you are my guest. And as a guest my duty is to make sure that you are happy or that you are having a good time. No matter if you order a sandwich or just order a soda, it doesn't matter to me you are my guest, so I will act and treat you accordingly to that."

The name AliBaba comes from Fevzi's home, Turkey, and has two aspects: Baba which means Brother or Uncle and Ali which is

a name. In fact it's a family owned business with two locations in Little Five Points and Downtown. The restaurant has been in Little Five for 11 years, but the building has been there for more.

"It was a decrepit building, the comments we got from other people were 'I think

I'd tear this thing down', but we kept it from being torn down," says Don Bender, an owner of the AliBaba building.

AliBaba, because it's remained in Little Five, has experienced the changing culture of the area. When Fevzi first came to Little Five, there were no other ethnic restaurants, yet Fevzi saw the area as a chance for his restaurant.

"It was an opportunity when you look at the demographics, and you look at the people around it," Fevzi says. "It was an artistic area people tended to be creative and tended to be also people who enjoy Mediterranean food."



AliBaba not only preserves the Turkish culture in an urban area, but it also gives an affordable option and is a perfect restaurant for people coming home from work who need to pick something up for dinner or just want some food. When Alyssa Baker walks in for the first time, on her way home from work, she looks at the menu and is surprised by the choices.


"I appreciate the vegan choice," Baker says. "You get tired of all the same vegan food."

Little 5's restaurants are changing, not only to accommodate modern life styles and bring more culture to the Little 5 area, but there are also ethnic restaurants having to move locations. Most recently was an African restaurant named Kimi's. Bender says there are two main problems.

"Disinterested property owners is one problem, and I say that meaning that's not across the board... and then the other big one is that we have a large dysfunctional community," Bender says. "And we're trying to respond in a way that is consistent with our decision as a whole whether to just tolerate it on one hand, and/or drive [the homeless] out on the other."

Despite challenges AliBaba remains in the changing community. It continues to bring middle eastern culture to the Little 5 Points area both in the food it serves and its hospitality.

"It's a family based restaurant, so it's not so much about turning it into a franchise or whatever," Fevzi says. "It's about enjoying providing something that you like, so if I decide to open a third location or whatever the case may be, you will enjoy yourself."



eorgia's "Little Grand Canyon" is a testament to the power of man's influence on the land. Massive gullies as deep as 150 feet were caused simply by poor farming practices during the 1800s, yet today they make some of the prettiest photographs within the state. The rare Plumleaf Azalea grows only in this region and blooms during July and August when most azaleas have lost their color. The canyon soil's pink, orange, red and purple hues make a beautiful natural

Visitors can enjoy views of the canyons from the rim trail, taking care to stay behind fences and off the fragile canyon edge. Hikers who explore the deepest canyons will usually find a thin layer of water along the trail, indication of the water table below. Guests who hike to canyons four and five may want to join the Canyon Climbers Club. Backpackers can stay overnight along the backcountry trail which highlights portions of the canyon and winds through mixed forest. Camping, cottages and efficiency units are available nearby at Florence Marina State Park on 45,000-acre Lake Walter F. George.




